

#### Blue Grass Win Lowers Tomy Lee's Odds

Tomy Lee's victory in the Blue Grass Stakes yesterday caused his price in the Caliente Future Book rod drop to 4-1. Dunce, who finished a bang-up second, was sliced from 40-1 to 15-1.

First Landing remains the 3-1 favorite, with Tomy Lee next, followed by Silver Spoon, Easy Spur and On-and-On, all at 6-1. Finnegan, Atoll, and Our Dad are all 2-1, Sword Dancer is 10-1, Hoist Away, Royal Orbit and Troilus, 15-1.




