

Longshot Wins Go On Dreaming Zips Gallant Davelle Falter

When Bryan Fann left the gate yesterday on Gallant Davelle he and every bettor who'd made her favorite thought he was sitting snug on a lot of horse.

But a \$39 winner—Go On Dreaming, ridden by Ben Feliciano—showed them otherwise by holding off seven fillies and mares to win Keeneland's featured \$8,000 Muir Meadows Purse.

By scoring a three-quarter length decision over Plue, G. A. Zimmerman and E. J. Zwiesler's Go On Dreaming,

from the Jim Morgan stable, dashed Fann's opportunity to post a triple in wins for the afternoon.

But the 3-year-old Gallant Davelle, whose liking for Keeneland in the past earned her 6-5 backing from the crowd of about 7,000, folded to eighth without any excuses, according to her rider.

"She won four in a row for us," Fann said on return to the jockey's room, "but she failed to fire (finishing sixth) last time out at Saratoga.

"She was running today just like she did that day at Saratoga," Fann continued. "When I left the gate I thought I was sitting with a lot of horse under me, but she just didn't fire."

Gallant Davelle, trained by Doug Davis, appeared to be bothered by the horse outside her at the start. She stayed near the pace, however, coming around horses on the backstretch to grab a spot on the turn just behind the front-running Go On Dreaming.

Several others also made runs at the winner but she showed in the stretch that she had something left, staying off not only Plue but Jay Bar Pet as well, another half-length back.

Finishing behind the first three came, in order, Pleasure Outing, Tappahannock, Princess Pleasure, Knitted Gloves, Gallant Davelle and Pretty Dusty.

Fann said the near brush at the start did not offer Gallant Davelle an excuse for her loss.

"The horse outside me came out," Fann said, "but it wasn't enough to bother her. Besides, I couldn't have claimed foul for something like that because she's got enough ability to overcome it."

"I don't know what is wrong with her. It could be she's had a hard year, though she has freshened up. Maybe she's getting tired of racing. But I don't believe she got tired today."

Go On Dreaming, a half-sister to Justa Dream Away, covered the six furlongs in 1:10 3-5, returning \$39, \$14 and \$7. Plue paid \$7.60 and \$5 and Jay Bar Pet returned \$5.80.

Earlier in the afternoon Fann rode two winners in a row for trainer Davis, scoring in the third aboard Rubber Tree and the fourth with Carmalita Gibbs. And, the stewards handed down their first ruling of the meet, a five-day suspension to Mike Manganello for his ride Saturday in the feature aboard Vuelo.

Manganello was suspended "for permitting his mount to bear out in the stretch, causing interference and resulting in a disqualification. The term runs Oct. 9-14.

Racing continues at 1:30 p.m. today.

Nevertheless, Kentucky's tough defensive unit, ranked

among the nation's elite shock troops, had made its point.

Tom Ranieri, brandishing a bandoleer and looking much like the winner in the Fidel Castro Look-Alike Contest, tried to explain his motley crew.

"We saw the reference to The Dirty Dozen in the local papers. Rick Fromm and I talked it over one day after practice.

"We liked the idea, and the next thing you knew, we

were down at J & H Army Surplus talking to John Hall. He said we could borrow all this equipment."

The uniform of the day was early "war is hell."

There was Mike Siganos wearing an Aussie bush hat, while Mike Emanuel, decked out in a non-descript outfit, resembled a Hogan's Heroes reject.

Greg Woods, stripped to the waist, was super cool in sun glasses and carbine. Meanwhile, on the other front, Jerry Blanton, super bad in a camouflaged shirt, puffed away on an El Ropo that should have been quarantined in Cuba for the duration.

As teammate Ron Cason took pictures for posterity, and many of the post offices across the country, "Captain" Tony Gray led the way, from a safe distance, of course.

After posing for stills, the group feigned an attack out of the Shively Sports Center bushes.

Kentucky No. 5— In Total Defense

Kentucky? Having a bad year on the football field? Never.

In spite of their less-than-enviable 1-2-1 won-lost-tied record, the Wildcats are enjoying a degree of success among the national statistics involving the nation's major teams.

For instance, the UK defensive team rates no worse than eighth in total defense, yielding 205 yards in four games. That's only .3 worse than Notre Dame's average.

Leader in that category is Texas A&M, which has given up just 137.2 yards, also in four outings.

Individually, as far as Kentucky is concerned, the name of course is Sonny Collins.

The Madisonville senior halfback now ranks fourth in rushing and is running slightly ahead of the No. 5 man, Archie Griffin of Ohio State.

Collins is averaging 138.5 yards per game with a total

of 554 yards. The leader is Rickey Bell of Southern Cal with an average of 180.7.

Going almost unnoticed is Toledo's Gene Swick, the leader in total offense with 254.2 yards and also in passing. Swick has completed 109 of 164 passes for an average of 21.8 yards per game.

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Reds Win NL Flag

PITTSBURGH (AP) — "He surprised me as much as anybody in the ballpark," said white-haired Sparky Anderson, manager of the 1975 National League champion Cincinnati Reds.

Anderson was talking about the two-strike bunt by outfielder Ken Griffey that set up the winning run in the 10th inning as the Reds beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-3 and entered the World Series starting Saturday against the Boston Red Sox in Boston.

"All I wanted to do was keep it between the foul lines," said Griffey, who, according to Anderson hadn't bunted in the last two months. "I didn't care where it went as long as it was fair."

In a game of countless dramatic moments, it was Armbrister—an obscure utility player who had 12 hits and two RBI during the season—who wound up the hero.

"Sooner or later, I knew I was going to contribute," said Armbrister, surrounded for the first time in memory by a mob of questioning reporters. "I've been telling them all year it was going to be my turn in the playoffs."

Armbrister said the first pitch from loser Ramon Hernandez was a fastball and he just figured that the Pirates' reliever would come back with another. Hernandez obliged and Armbrister hit the fly that made the Reds National League champions.

Pittsburgh rookie John Candelaria, who pitched superb baseball for the Pirates, relaxed with a beer and seemed outwardly undismayed by a fine performance that just wasn't enough. He said: "Strikeouts don't mean anything. I could have struck out 20 but it wouldn't have meant anything if we lost."

Pittsburgh Manager Danny Murtaugh sat in his customary rocking chair, slowly moving back and forth.

"Candy did a helluva job for

us, but the Reds showed tonight why they're a good ballclub," said Murtaugh. "They came back and got the big one they needed."

Hernandez said of his crucial balk in the 10th inning: "How could it be a balk? I pitched the same way I always pitched and I never had a balk in the big leagues."

It was a team finish to a game that had been a duel of home runs, highlighted by Candelaria's great performance and a last-of-the-ninth rally by Pittsburgh that sent the game into extra innings.

For awhile it appeared the Pirates were going to stay alive as their starting pitcher, rookie John Candelaria, turned in one of the most masterful pitching performances in playoff competition.

Candelaria began the game by striking out the first four batters he faced and fanned a major league record-tying 14 batters in the 7-2-3 innings he pitched, while allowing the Reds only one hit over the first seven innings.

That hit was a solo homer by Concepcion in the second inning, but a two-run homer
